"Why I have six air conditioners" by Matthew Wright, executive director of Beyond Zero Emissions

Matthew says by using reverse cycle air conditioners we can cut down total gas and electricity energy use for heating and cooling by more than 80 per cent. "The Australian test condition is 7degrees C and the best [reverse cycle] units run at 500 per cent efficiency at this temperature (and even higher efficiency at higher temperatures which are the norm in most cities most of the time). We need to take a cool headed approach and evaluate all the options and Renewable Heat using heat pumps is the biggest onsite renewable source available to all Australians especially those in high rise units who may miss out on the opportunity to install solar hot water or rooftop solar photovoltaic panels." "The International Energy Agency is reportedly about to release a groundbreaking report on how solar will provide most of the world's power within 50 years, so it is timely that Australia should be about to break ground on its first utility-scale solar project. Verve Energy has announced the details of its 10MW solar PV project to be built at Geraldton. It will be the first utility-scale solar plant in the country when it is commissioned in the middle of next year, but is likely to be followed quickly by others."
